GOSPEL: (John 20:1-9) The teaching of scripture is that he must rise from the dead.

From the Pastor

My Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In St Thomas the Apostle Church at Camp Hill in Brisbane, where I served before coming to Moonah-Lutana Parish, the Stations of the Cross comprise a set of bas-relief images cast in plaster. These images convey the traditional Stations, commencing with Jesus condemned by Pilate and concluding with the body of Jesus being placed in the sepulchre. The figures are painted white, while the background is in shades of blue-black which darken towards the Station marking the death of Jesus on the cross, and then become lighter so that the final Station hints at the resurrection of Jesus, though this is not portrayed.

In contrast, the Stations of the Cross here in St Therese's Church are a set of colourful richly painted images. These images convey Scriptural Stations, beginning with the Last Supper and concluding with the resurrection of Jesus. That the Stations of the Cross in our church differ from the traditional Stations reflects the variety of ways Catholics have understood the Way of the Cross and in which artists have portrayed it. In point of fact, the Stations of the Cross are actually the crosses, which custom generally accompanies with images.

In our Stations of the Cross, the portrayal of Jesus victorious over death in the final Station is such that we can readily identify him with the figure of Jesus in the preceding Stations. It probably needs to be like this for our sake, so that there is no mistaking that the figure shown at the Last Supper, who stands before Pilate, and who is crucified, is the same figure we see in the resurrection. Yet it wasn't like this for the first disciples of Jesus.

Mary of Magdala, who met the risen Jesus in the garden, did not recognise him until he spoke her name. Cleopas and the other disciple who the risen Jesus accompanied on the road to Emmaus did not recognise him until he took the bread, said the blessing, broke the bread and handed it to them. In the upper room the disciples took fright when the risen Jesus appeared and stood among them. And at the shore of the Sea of Tiberias the disciples at first did not recognise the risen Jesus as he cooked breakfast for them. In each instance Jesus appeared to his disciples in his risen and glorified body yet they did not immediately recognise him.

As we once again celebrate the resurrection of Jesus this Easter, we do well to learn from the first disciples of Jesus that in the ways in which we can meet and encounter him – in his word, in the liturgy, in the sacraments, in the Church, in one another, in the face of those who suffer and live in poverty – his presence may not at first be discernible to us. Our Risen Lord will likely not come to us as we might expect or prefer, but he will surely come to us in the ways we truly need – to strengthen our faith in him, to heal and nourish us, to appoint us to serve in his name, to send us on mission. I pray that we may receive him with joy and gratitude.

May the grace of the Risen Christ be with you and your families this Easter.

Alleluia!
